National Poll Demonstrates Strong Support for Patient-Centered Reform of the 340B Drug Pricing Program

Four out of Five Rhode Islanders Support Reforms to End 340B Program Abuses

The 340B Drug Pricing Program was created to help low-income and uninsured patients access their life-saving medications and care. Unfortunately, some 340B hospitals, the pharmacies they contract with, and pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) have manipulated the program into a massive profit-generating scheme by failing to pass drug discount savings onto patients.

Polled Rhode Islanders Agree: 340B Should Benefit Patients, Not Hospital & Middlemen Profits

Direct Patient Benefit



78% of surveyed adults in Rhode Island agree that hospitals receiving 340B discounts should be required to pass those savings on to low-income and vulnerable patients.

More Transparency



78% of surveyed adults in Rhode Island support increasing transparency by allowing for audits on how hospitals and pharmacies are using 340B.

Debt Collection



77% of surveyed adults in Rhode Island are concerned that many 340B hospitals use aggressive debt collection practices against patients who cannot afford care.
